


"June means schooling offshore bass!"

June brings the official first day of Summer. That means school is out and the Bass schools are in session.

June Bass Fishing means predominantly "offshore" angling for the most part. Graph points, underwater bridges, ridges, road beds and humps for bait fish and Bass. Typically, you'll want to graph/ scan

the 17 to 25 ft depth on these structures to determine if there are schools of bait and Bass present. Sometimes the Bass will be on the top of these structures, but oftentimes they will set up on the downwind side to ambush bait fish. This year we're running a little lower than average water temperatures for the time of year, so timing on the spots could be of some help. These spots will often times have a shell bed, rock or road debris that is the key spot and others will have timber and/ or a steep drop that Bass relate to. Time on the water and experience will dial you in on specific spots and cast line ups.

As for set ups I'll have on my front deck dium Heavy Rod. in June: A magnum, deep diving crank bait on a 7' 11" to 8' heavy cranking rod with 15# Seaguar InvizX Fluorocarbon line. The biggest and most aggressive Bass in a school will most often bite this lure first. So, get to slinging the big crank.

A magnum size Shakey Head Jig, 5/8-3/4



oz with a 7 to 12" straight tail worm on 20# Seaguar InvizX Fluorocarbon Line and a 7' 3" Heavy Action or a 7' 6" Me-

The Mop Up Pitcher of Lake Fork is the venerable Carolina Rig. 3/4- 1 Oz weight, 3 foot or so of 15 to 20# leader tied to mainline of 20# Seaguar InvizX Fluorocarbon Line. Attach the soft plastic lure of your choice and confidence and drag away my friends. Many a client has announced

their disdain for the "Ball and Chain" to me over the many years. That is until they land their Personal Best Bass on it and then state that they now like the Carolina Rig.

A Flutter Spoon is at the ready for suspended Bass, on a 7' to 7' 3" Medium Heavy Action Rod and 17-20# Seaguar InvizX Fluorocarbon line.

I hope you have a wonderful Summer and if you are interested in doing some "offshore" Bassin' in June, I'd love to have you out there or get you with my colleagues.

"The Moon Report"

"June Fishing on Fork"

Ahhh – June fishing on Fork – it's one of my favorite months to fish! June can produce 'BIG' fish in all species. It's so exciting when we are surprised by a huge bream, a big bass, or a hard fighting white bass, or catfish while crappie fishing!

The majority of the crappie are "post spawn" and have moved out to structure in 10 to 30 ft. depths. You might find a few late spawners shallower around the new and full moon this month.

The crappie are showing up around bridges, standing timber, in creek channels, and brush piles. Don't be afraid to change up your presentation. Some days they want the bait moving, and other days they want it dead still. It's sure fun to watch the reaction of the fish on Live Scope! Those crappie don't always "SLAM" the baits - so, you need to be vigilant in watching your line because the sneaky ones will push your bait up and your line will go slack. If your not watching, you'll probably miss that fish.

Also, the color jig they prefer can change daily, so keep a good assortment on hand. Right now I am using an as-



sortment of "Limits Tackle, Skipper Jigs, and Bonehead Stump Bugs. The colors producing now have been white and chartreuse, grey/black, electric chicken, and L.S.U. These are all available at Lake Fork Marina along with all your crappie fishing needs.

Another reason I love June fishing on Fork is it's time for some bream action! They are showing up in brush piles and around bridge ledges. But, around new and the full moon, they will be in 1-5 ft. on slip bobbers. Others will back off in that 5-15 ft. and I will tightline with night crawlers or crickets just off the bottom. Hang on tight because you never know what you might catch while fishing for these bream! I'm sure looking forward to the next full moon!

It's great to be back after a few weeks in Missouri. Our lake level is

finally back to normal and looking beautiful! The fish are biting and it feels so good to be back in my "Luxury Liner" – (my Skeeter Solera). A 'BIG' thank you Skeeter for creating such a comfortable boat for us crappie fishermen!

Hey don't forget – the first weekend in June is the incredible "Skeeter Boat Owners Tournament" at Lake Fork Marina, so come out to watch the hourly weigh-ins and check out all the vendors. They put on an amazing event.

TPWD Awards \$6.8 Million in Recreational Trails Grants to Texas Communities

During a recent meeting, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission approved more than \$6.8 million in grants, funding 24 trail construction and maintenance projects across the state. The National Recreational Trails Fund (NRTF) supports recreational trail construction, renovation and acquisition through grants funded from a portion of the federal gas tax generated by fuel purchases for off-highway vehicles. The fund must be used to support a diverse mix of both motorized and non-motorized trail projects. This year, \$5.28 million in NRTF funds were made available for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Recreational Trails Grants Program. In addition to the federal funds, \$1.52 million of the state Sporting Goods Sales Tax was allocated for eligible trail projects. A portion of the grant funds, up to \$900,000, will be used to support trail improvement projects in state parks.

Projects awarded funding are listed in alphabetical order by county below: In Bandera County, the Albert and Bessie Kronkosky State Natural Area received \$300,000 for the construction of six additional miles of multi-use natural surface trails at the site.

The city of Beeville in Bee County received \$300,000 for trail upgrades in community parks. Improvements include the renovation of 2.6-miles of existing asphalt/ gravel trails to 10-foot-wide asphalt trails across five sites, benches, trash cans, bike racks, water fountains, signage and lighting. Universal City in Bexar County received \$220,800 for phase two of the Cibolo Creek Recreational Trail. The project includes constructing a 1.23-mile cement-stabilized base trail with wayfinding signage. College Station's Texas Independence Park in Brazos County received \$287,997 for the west phase trails project. Improvements include the construction of three miles of natural surface multi-use trail and .73-mile concrete trail connections with benches and trash cans. The Texas Motorized Trails Coalition (TMTC) received \$328,672 to create trails and park improvements to Ozona's Escondido Draw Recreation Area in Crockett County. The project includes the renovation of 10 miles of trail, equipment repair and rental, surveys, engineering and professional services. In Ozona, an additional \$400,000 was allocated

to TMTC's Escondido Draw Recreation Area in Crockett County to purchase trail equipment, engineering and professional services. The Paso Del Norte Community Foundation in El Paso County received \$292,072 for safety and accessibility renovations to the Paso Del Norte Trail. The project will feature renovations along a 7.5-mile section of existing trail including concrete repair, street crossing, signage, picnic tables, trash receptables, bike racks and pet waste stations. In Harris County, the TMTC Rio Bravo Adventure Park received \$500,000 for improvements to the site. Work will include the renovation of six miles of trail and track, signage, electrical and septic updates, pavilion repairs, access road repairs, equipment repairs and rentals, resource surveys and engineering. The TMTC Rio Bravo Recreation Area in Harris County received \$400,000 for the purchase of a bulldozer/tractor and attachments, equipment maintenance and hand tools. In Houston, Harris County received \$240,000 for improvements to the Terry Hershey Trail. The project includes the renovation



of three miles of asphalt hike and bike trail. In Hays County, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's San Marcos Aquatic Research Center received \$57,427 for the rehabilitation of interior trails. Improvements include the renovation of a 1.75-mile trail, construction of a .56-mile trail with gravel turnpike, parking improvement and signage. The city of Farmersville-NETT Section 4 in Hunt County received \$75,000 for the construction of 1.9-miles of rail-to-trail surfacing. In McLennan County, the Waco Motorcycle Club received \$337,200 for improvements to

the Waco Eagles Motocross Dirt Bike Park. The project includes the renovation of 10-miles of trail, parking, entrance signage, visitor building, lighting and security, fencing, a maintenance building, fuel and equipment rental. The Castroville Regional Park in Medina County received \$300,000 for the construction of 1.3-miles of trail, a pedestrian bridge, parking spaces, 2.4-miles of trail renovation and signage. Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches County received \$285,004 for its Building a Path to the Future at the SFA Gardens project. Improvements include the construction of

.24-miles of trail, renovation of 7.7-miles of trail, boardwalks, bridges, the and the installation of 12 trailhead signs. In Nueces County, the city of Port Aran-

sas received \$241,515 to improve connectivity and accessibility in the Port Aransas Trail System. The project includes the construction of a .18-mile connecting trail, widening a .31-mile trail to six feet for ADA access, and renovations to a .48-mile loop trail. Palo Pinto Mountains State Park in Palo Pinto County received \$300,000 for the construction of six additional miles of multi-use natural surface trail at the site. Arlington Parks and Recreation in Tarrant County received \$239,700 for the redevelopment of the River Legacy Park Trail. The project includes the renovation of an existing .49-mile trail to 12-foot-wide concrete. The Austin Parks and Recreation Department in Travis County received \$300,000 chase of equipment for the creation of the Onion Creek Greenbelt trailhead and trail expansion. 

Iconic Indian Lodge Reopens After Remodel

The historic Indian Lodge, nestled within Davis Mountains State Park, has completed its extensive remodel and is now open for reservation. This historic and treasured West Texas retreat was built by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) in the 1930s and features white adobe walls and southwestern charm. "We sincerely thank our visitors for their patience during the temporary closure and look forward to welcoming you back to the tranquility and historic charm of Indian Lodge State Park and the Black Bear Restaurant," said Torrey Bonham, superintendent of Davis Mountains State Park. Renovation work completed during the closure included infrastructure upgrades such as air conditioning, electrical, and plumbing systems, as well as pool repairs, fire alarm system enhancements, new windows and doors, and a newly redesigned and landscaped courtyard. Visitors can now book their next West Texas adventure to Indian Lodge through the Texas State

Parks Online Reservation System or by call-


ing the Reservations Center at (512) 389-8900

during normal business hours. For additional questions about booking, the Indian Lodge front office can be reached at (432) 426-3254. With the renovations now complete, guests will have an opportunity to stay in both the modern and historically significant sections of the lodge. These preserved units showcase the craftsmanship and legacy of one of the New Deal's most iconic public works program — the CCC. These features offer visitors a unique blend of rustic elegance and historical significance.

Additionally, the Indian Lodge pool has undergone refurbishment and has reopened in time for the summer season. The Black Bear Restaurant has also emerged from hibernation and is offering a buffet-style breakfast and lunch from 7 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Thursday through Monday. The restaurant will have a brief closure from 10 –11 a.m. daily for meal transitions. Weekly menus will be shared on the Indian Lodge Facebook page. Located in Jeff Davis County, Indian Lodge is a full-service hotel located within Davis Moun-

tains State Park northwest of Fort Davis. The first section of the lodge was built by the CCC in the 1930s to resemble a multilevel pueblo village. The original CCC work can still be seen at the lodge in the original interiors and furnishings. More rooms and amenities were added to the site in the late 1960s. The structure of the lodge includes 18-inch adobe walls, hand-carved cedar furniture, and ceilings of pine viga and latilla.

Texas Master Naturalist Program Receives Prestigious Society for Range Management Outstanding Achievement Award

The Society for Range Management (SRM) recognized the Texas Master Naturalist (TMN) program with its Outstanding Achievement Award for commitment to community engagement. The award goes to those working to manage, conserve and enjoy the vast landscapes known as rangelands. SRM is an international professional scientific society and conservation organization whose

members study, conserve, manage and sustain the varied resources of the rangelands, including prairie, shrublands, woodlands and savannahs.

TMN is the nation's first volunteer naturalist program of its kind to be implemented on a statewide scale and now serves as a model for other states. It is designed to develop a local corps of "master volunteers" who provide education, outreach and service dedicated to the beneficial management of natural resources and natural areas within their communities.

As of 2024, TMN had trained more than 17,400 certified volunteers, impacted more than 260,400 acres of wildlife and native plant habitats, contributed more than 7.5 million hours of service and reached more than 7.13 million Texas residents of all ages. These volunteer efforts are estimated to be worth more than \$170 million to the state of Texas.


The program recently celebrated its 25th anniversary of providing education, outreach and service to communities throughout Texas with an average 7,000 active volunteers in 49 chapters serving 213 counties across the state.

In addition to education and outreach, TMN volunteers assist in the operation of parks, nature centers and natural areas around the state and provide leadership in local conservation efforts.



Game Warden Field Notes

The following items are compiled from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement reports.

--Venom and Vice--

A Milam County Game Warden received a call on Feb. 1 from a concerned landlord about a tenant reportedly keeping several venomous snakes in an apartment near the Cameron ISD Middle School. Given the nature of the call and the tenant's history, game wardens from Travis and Williamson counties, along with the Milam County Sheriff's Office, assisted with the

investigation.

Upon contact, the tenant admitted to possessing multiple snakes and allowed wardens to inspect them. Inside warthe apartment, dens observed what appeared to be methamphetamine and drug paraphernalia in plain sight. A field test confirmed the substance as methamphetamine, and the suspect was arrested for possession of a controlled substance. The tenant's apartment is located within 1,000 feet of a school, placing the offense within a designated drug-free zone.

After being Miran-

dized, he confessed to keeping a monocled cobra, a green bush viper, rat snakes, bull snakes and approximately 25 rattlesnakes—without the required permit or a hunting license.

Due to the presence of the openly visible narcotics, wardens obtained a search warrant, which led to the discovery of additional narcotics, drug paraphernalia and more unlawfully possessed snakes. Wardens seized the reptiles and transferred them to a licensed permit holder who is equipped to care for them.



The suspect now faces multiple charges, including possession of a controlled substance penalty group 1, possession of drug paraphernalia, no valid hunting license and a violation for the lack of a nonindigenous snake permit.

--Montgomery County Landowner Ruffles Feathers with Case of Mistaken Identity-

Texas Game Wardens received reports from a caller saying they witnessed a bald eagle shot in Montgomery County. The warden spoke to the landowner who admitted to shooting a hawk that had been harassing his chickens. While searching the property, the warden discovered an injured bald eagle hidden underneath a tarp. The landowner confessed to shooting the eagle and said he planned to try to fix its wing.

The game warden seized the eagle and transported it to a veterinary hospital, where it was evaluated and prepped for surgery to try to repair its broken wing and gunshot wound. Despite best efforts, the eagle ultimately had to be euthanized.

After completing the initial investigation, Texas Game Wardens turned the case over to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), which will inquire into the situation further and file necessary

charges.

"While we never like to see an incident like this occur, we appreciate the caller's prompt actions in reporting the violation so Texas Game Wardens could investigate and try to give the eagle its best chance at survival," said Col. Ronald VanderRoest, TPWD Law Enforcement Director. "We are grateful for our partnership with the USFWS who will help in the prosecution of this crime and hopefully prevent violations of this nature from occurring in the future."

-- Mule Deer Mishap- A Crockett County Game Warden received a call from a ranch hand in Pecos County reporting two hunters illegally harvesting mule deer. The ranch in question operates under the Managed Lands Deer Program, allowing for extended seasons for white-tailed and mule deer. Hunters could legally harvest white-tailed deer by any lawful means at that time, but mule deer could only be harvested by lawful archery equipment until Nov. 2.

The ranch hand reported that the two hunters, who were instructed to shoot only white-tailed deer, had

shot two mule deer bucks with modern firearms. Crockett County and Brewster County Game Wardens responded the next day to interview the hunters, who admitted to shooting the bucks at last light when they saw antlers in the brush. They claimed they mistook the mule deer for white-tailed deer and took the shots as soon as the deer stood up. The wardens seized both bucks and issued citations for unlawful means and methods, warnings for taking mule deer out of season and the hunters were charged civil restitution for the two bucks.

--Not the "Reel" Deal-- A Bowie County Game Warden received a call about an individual claiming to be an undercover game warden working the Wright Patman Lake Spillway. The caller said the supposed warden was checking fish and fishing licenses and commenting on the legality of fish being kept. The caller was able to provide a description of the individual and a license plate number registered in Arkansas.

Before Bowie County wardens, working with Arkansas Game Wardens, could visit the suspect's (Continued on Next Page)

house, however, the original caller reached out again to say the supposed warden was back at the spillway, making the same claims. A warden immediately headed to the spillway, where he observed the suspect in action and wearing law enforcement gear, though he was unarmed. As the suspect was heading back to his vehicle, the warden intercepted him for questioning. The man denied all claims, stating he was there because he worked for a road construction company.

After getting statements from witnesses, the warden obtained an arrest warrant for the suspect who later turned himself in. Charges are pending.

-Baiting and Blasting-- An Atascosa County Game Warden was monitoring a property where illegal hunting activity was suspected. After hearing several shotgun blasts, the warden entered the property and discovered two men hunting dove over bait. It was during a special white-wing only season and only two mourning doves were allowed per hunter. The hunters were intentionally over their limit of mourning dove and were still actively hunting when the warden arrived.

While investigating the incident, the warden looked through feed sacks in the bed of a truck.

tagged jake Rio Grande turkeys in an empty feed sack. One hunter admitted to shooting them earlier in the day and had asked the second hunter to dispose of the carcasses, which he had not yet done.

The hunters were issued citations for killing turkeys out of season, exceeding the daily bag limit of mourning doves, placing bait to attract and hunting over bait. The illegally taken game was seized and donated. Cases and civil restitution are pending.

--Red Snapper Snag-- Calhoun County and Victoria County Game Wardens conducted an offshore patrol out of Port O'Connor aboard the PV Birmingham to detect undocumented federal charter boats along the nine-mile line. During a routine water safety and fisheries inspection, they found a recreational vessel illegally in possession of 11 red snapper in federal waters during the federal closure.

The red snapper were measured and photographed for evidence before being donated to those in need. -- Hook, Line, and Felony-- An Amarillo District Game Wardens were patrolling Southeast Park Lake in Randall County when they observed a

> When questioned, the man admitted he didn't have a fishing license. While running his information through dispatch, wardens learned the man had a felony parole violation warrant. They arrested him without incident and transported him to the Randall County Jail.

> After the man was booked into jail, wardens returned to their patrol truck and checked the passenger seat where the man had been sitting. One of the wardens discovered three plastic baggies that had been stuffed into the lower portion of the seat, containing approximately 20 grams of a crystal substance that appeared to be methamphetamine. Upon questioning the man, he admitted to having previously used methamphetamine but claimed his girlfriend had placed them in his possession.

Centennial Time Capsule Moves to Blanco State Park

The Centennial Time Capsule, which encompasses 100 years of Texas State Parks history, hit the road once again and headed to Blanco State Park as part of its 50-year trek to every state park. The time capsule, which houses one object from every state park and support program, went on display at Abilene State Park in November. "Staff at Abilene State Park were honored to host the Centennial Time Capsule," said

"The park saw many folks travel to Abilene from all corners of Texas and beyond to view this remarkable piece of state park history. Many were especially impressed by its craftsmanship and the use of pecan wood from Mother Neff State Park."

Additionally, several visitors expressed excitement at the prospect of being around in 50 years to view the opening of the time capsule and getting a peek at the historic artifacts placed inside.

The time capsule will now be on display at Blanco State Park in the Texas Hill Country before moving to its next location. "The staff at Blanco State Park are very excit-


ed and proud to host the Time Capsule," said Mark Pearson, Blanco State Park Superintendent. "It has already been interesting to see visitor's reactions to it as we explain its origin and that it is just beginning its 50-year trip around our great state and its beautiful parks."

The five-foot-tall wooden time capsule weighs more than 300 pounds and was made from pecan trees harvested at Mother Neff State Park, the site widely accepted as the first Texas State Park opened to the public. It is made from solid wood and bronze and is large enough to hold more than 100 items. Sitting atop the capsule is a sculpture in the shape of Texas with all park locations marked. Additionally, there are 100 name plates recognizing all contributing parks and programs, six regional bas relief panels and a plaque on the front with a message to the future.

For the contents of the time capsule, park staff had to choose an item that would tell a story about that site, fit in a box the size of a coffee mug, survive 50 years and be strong enough to travel the roads of Texas.

"Time capsules are usually buried in the ground and forgotten until it's time to open

them, but ours will remain on display, so we wanted it to be a work of art and showcase the excellent craftsmanship of our exhibit team," said Stephen Garrett, Exhibits Manager for Texas State Parks. "This is something totally unique and I don't think anyone's ever made a time capsule quite like this before. I'm proud of the thought, care and work that went into the capsule's creation and hope park visitors enjoy seeing it as much as we did creating it."

Slight Increase in Hunting Accidents Highlights Need for Vigilance in the Field

Texas experienced an increase in hunting accidents with last year, with 18 non-fatal hunting accidents and one fatality reported in the 2024 Texas Hunting Accident Report. "Safe hunting in Texas starts with you," said Matthew Smith, Hunter Education Coordinator for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD). "Hunting accidents are preventable by following basic safety rules we call the '10 Commandments of Shooting Safey,' especially the primary rule – pointing the firearm's muzzle in a safe direction at all times."

In Bell County, a hunter fired at low-flying, wounded dove outside of his safe zone and 'peppered' his hunting companion with shot pellets. A dozen pellets struck the victim from head to legs. This accident could have been prevented if the hunter stuck to a "safe zone of fire" and communicated his position with others. While scouting for ducks in Bowie County, a hunter hung a loaded shotgun in a tree while checking for leaks in his waders. The trigger caught and discharged, sending pellets into his upper thigh. This accident could have been avoided by adhering to the basic hunter safety course rules for handling firearms. It's important to remember to always unload firearms when not hunting and never leave it unattended. Below are some tips to help ensure a safe experienceforhunters whether they're athome, intransit to their hunting spot or spending time in the field. * Mind Your Muzzle: Whether in transit or in the

field, the muzzle should always be pointing in a safe the need for more firearm safety, which led to direction. This is the most important safety rule. * Clear the Chamber: Unload all firearms when not in use, especially at home, during transport and in the field. Guns should be unloaded as soon as you are finished hunting to avoid accidental discharge. * On Guard: Keep your fingers outside of the trigger guard until ready to take a shot. * Gear Up: Waterfowl hunters should wear protective clothing, waders and approved life jackets while in boats or around water, especially in winter months. Drowning ranks as the number one cause of waterfowl hunting-related fatalities. * Safe Space: For dove, quail and pheasant hunters, the number one cause for accidents or fatalities is shooting at game outside a safe zone of fire. Communicate and stick to your safe zone of fire and never shoot towards another hunter, buildings or structures, or domestic animals such as cows. For more information on safe zones of fire, visit the TPWD Hunter Education webpage. * Bull's-eye and Beyond: Be sure of your target including what is in front and behind. No one can take a shot back, so don't shoot until certain of what could be struck. * Blazing Style: Wearing blaze orange while in the field allows you to be seen by other hunters and reduces the potential for hunting accidents. Texas' highest record to date occurred in 1968 when the state saw 37 fatal hunting-related accidents. The numbers recorded every year showed

the creation of the Hunter Education program. Since Hunter Education became a requirement for all hunters in 1988, Texas' hunting accident rate has steadily decreased. Only a single fatality has been reported for each of the last six years. More than 1.6 million students have been certified with Hunter Education since 1972. Hunter Education is required for every hunter in Texas (including out-of-state hunters) born on or after Sept. 2, 1971. The minimum age for certification is nine years old and certification is good for life.

There are two in-person course options for anyone under 17 years of age — a six-hour classroom course or a four-hour field course preceded by a home study Internet course. Additionally, those 17 and over can alternatively take and pass an approved online-only course. Courses can be found by visiting the Hunter Education page. Classes are also offered at schools, clubs and venues throughout Texas communities.

Hunters must show proof of Hunter Education certification on their person while in the field. Hunters have access to their Texas proof of Hunter Education in the free Outdoor Annual mobile app for iOS and Android.

Hemorrhagic Rabbit

Detected Disease

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD)– has received confirmation of Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease Virus 2 (RHDV2) in multiple black-tailed jackrabbits in Runnels County. This marks the 35th county in the state to have a confirmed wild detection since March 2020, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The number and broad geographic distribution of these detections means researchers consider RHDV2 endemic (widespread) in Texas. Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease is a highly contagious viral disease that can affect both domestic and wild rabbit species including hares. jackrabbits and cottontails. RHDV2 appears only to affect rabbit species (lagomorphs). It is not known to affect humans, livestock or pets. However, pets should not be allowed to

consume dead animal carcasses. RHDV2 is nearly always fatal and affects rabbits of all ages. Domestic rabbit owners should practice proper biosecurity protocols and can reach out to their veterinarian to discuss vaccination. Clinical signs of RHDV2 can include dullness/ lethargy, lack of appetite, bleeding from the nose andeyes or watery, congested eyes, however most affected rabbits are commonly found deceased. RHDV2 can persist on rabbit carcasses after death for many months. As such, TPWD recommends hunters move the least amount of biological material possible from a harvest location. Hunters that transport harvested rabbits home for consumption should discard any remaining parts in a dumpster destined for a landfill. TPWD continues to receive and respond to

mortality events in wild rabbits and hares across the state. If you notice sick or dead wild rabbits, contact a local TPWD wildlife biologist. Learn more about RHDV2 in wild rabbits on the RHDV page of the TPWD website.


