20th Annual Berkley Big Bass Tournament on Lake Fork (Continued from Page 1)

The 20th Annual Berkley Big Bass Tournament was held on Lake Fork on October 18th and 19th. Over 1,300 anglers representing numerous states came to try their luck to win some of the money to be given away.

Anglers could not complain about the weather on Saturday. Winds were moderate out of the South and the bass responded. Sunday did draw some complaints with the northern that came in with cooler temperatures. The catch wasn't as good on Sunday as it was on Saturday. Many of the anglers said they could not fish on their favorite spots on Sunday because of the white caps and winds.

Although there were only 5 bass over the slot of 24" Lake Fork did show out. The bass 16" and under ranged in the high 2-pound category with many ranging 2.70-pounds and higher. This shows what the future of Lake Fork has in store.

Place in each hour to \$200 for 10th Place many plus bass. Other anglers that landed in 11th through 15th received an Abu Garcia reel and 16th through 20th received an Abu Garcia rod. So if they didn't receive a check they weren't completely disappointed receiving a nice prize.

As in all of Berkley Big Bass Tournaments there is a Grand Prize of a Skeeter Bass Boat given to the heaviest bass under the slot and the heaviest over the slot. This year to commemorate Berkley's 20th Annual they gave the same Skeeter ZX200 to both the heaviest over the slot and the heaviest under. Randy Klevenski from Plantersville, Texas won the heaviest under with a bass weighing 3.13-pounds. For his catch he won \$1,000 hourly and a Skeeter ZX200 powered by a Yamaha SHO and Skeeter built trailer. Winning the heaviest over the 24" slot was Robert Washington from

With the pay-outs ranging from \$1,000 for 1st Waterproof, Louisiana with a bass that weighed 9.48-pounds that he brought to the scales in the anglers took home good money for a 2-pound 12 o'clock hour on Saturday. For his great catch he took home \$1,000 in hourly cash and a Skeeter ZX200 powered by a Yamaha SHO and a Skeeter built trailer. Also taking home \$1,000 in hourly monies for bass 24" and over was Mack Randle from Sulphur Springs, Texas with a 7.55-pound bass; Tater Reynolds from Florien, Louisiana with an 8.53-pound bass; Leo Moses from Kaufman, Texas with an 8.79-pound bass; Jamie Russell from Graham, Texas with a 9.03-pound bass. In the 2024 Berkley Tournament there was only one over 24" weighed in during the course of the tournament. This shows fishing is getting better on Lake Fork. An exciting point in the tournament was when 10 year old Leo Moses weighed in an 8.79-pound he caught. Leo caught this bass on 8-pound test line and when his father went for the net he already had



and bladed jigs, as the Bass are following Shad schools around, gorging up for the onset of Winter. Go to work with the 4 X 4 of Bass Fishing, the Squarebill Crankbait or a lipless crankbait. Don't be shy on line size on your Squarebill crankbait, as you want to fish it near, against and around cover. I run 17-20 lb Seaguar InvizX Fluorocarbon on mine and the same on the lipless crankbait. A rod specifically designed for crankbaits will help you keep Bass hooked up when they head shake or make that last hard dive at boat side. For square bills, a rod the size and build such as the Dobyns 705CB or 706CB is the ticket. They make the 705CB model in many different series to fit different budgets. I prefer a 7' 3" to 7' 6" rod for a lipless crankbait, with the rod action rating depending on if I'm fishing grass and need to snap the lure out of it or not.




channel back in a creek are places to target Bass ambushing baitfish this month.

Ripping bladed jigs out of vegetation can be productive earlier in the month. But as temperatures drop and the vegetation starts to die back, Bass will gravitate to hard wood structure. Pick Seawalls/bulkheads, rip rap, backs of pockets, up a trusty pitching rod 7' to 7' 3"or skipping rod coves and creeks or the last bit of deep creek 6' 10" to 7' with some 20 lb test Seaguar InvizX

Fluorocarbon with a pegged TX Rig craw/ creature bait or jig and go to work around shallow to mid-depth timber and docks.

I hope you get to enjoy the November weather, foliage, fishing and lack of angling pressure. Happy Thanksgiving to everyone and be safe out there.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) encourages waterfowl hunters to take action to protect Texas water bodies from the spread of aquatic invasive species like zebra mussels and giant salvinia that can degrade waterfowl habitats and block access.

Hunters can make a difference to help protect waterfowl and the hunting experience by simply taking a few minutes to clean, drain and dry their boats and equipment, including decoys and other hunting gear, before traveling from lake to lake. These simple steps help keep these invasive species from spreading to new waters. Aquatic invasive plants can easily become entangled or trapped on boats and boat trailers or even tow vehicles and be moved to other lakes. Hunters should also make sure they aren't inadvertently carrying invasive species on other equipment like waders, decoys, decoy bags and marsh sleds by cleaning, draining and drying this equipment as well. A video to help hunt-

ers learn how to properly clean, drain and dry their largely between Houston and Beaumont. Howgear can be found on the TPWD YouTube Channel. ever, other invasive plants are present in many

Giant salvinia, a highly invasive, free-floating aquatic fern that can double its coverage area in a week, can produce thick surface mats that impact the ecosystem and aquatic life and make access for hunting, fishing, boating, swimming and other water recreation nearly impossible. It only takes a single fragment moved to a new lake to cause a new infestation. "Giant salvinia is often thought of as a plant that blocks recreational access for anglers and boaters, but it can cause serious problems for waterfowl hunters too," said John Findeisen, TPWD aquatic habitat enhancement team lead. "Not only does it form thick mats that block hunters' access to prime waterfowl hunting areas, but it can also outgrow and replace the native plants that waterfowl rely on for food and habitat." Giant salvinia is currently present on 28 East Texas lakes and numerous rivers, creeks and marshes

largely between Houston and Beaumont. However, other invasive plants are present in many other lakes, and it is important to be vigilant and clean, drain, dry when leaving any water body. Zebra mussels, non-native shellfish that attach to hard surfaces, pose a significant threat to our lakes and our economy. These invasive mussels cause costly damage to boats and infrastructure for water supply and control, alter lake ecosystems and cause harm to native aquatic life. They also litter shorelines with hazardous, sharp shells that impact lakefront recreation.

"Waterfowl hunters can help keep invasive mussels and aquatic plants, that may also have mussels attached, from being moved and harming more lakes by taking a few minutes to remove mud, plants and debris from boats, along with draining all water before leaving the lake and allowing everything to dry completely afterward before traveling to a new location,"

"The Moon Report" November Crappie Fishing

By Terri Moon

November brings cooler weather, falling leaves, and some of the best crappie fishing of the year on Lake Fork. As water temperatures begin to drop to the low to mid 60's, it triggers that fall feeding push before winter sets in.

As the lake transitions, in early November, crappie start moving from their scattered late summer patterns back toward deeper brush piles, bridge columns, and standing timber near creek channels. These transition areas are often 15 to 25 feet deep and hold both black and white crappie this time of year. You'll often find them suspended just above the brush, grouped tightly and ready to feed.

Electronics make all the difference now. Forward-facing sonar or down imaging lets you see schools clearly, to determine what depths you need to target. In November, crappie are usually suspended 12-20 feet down, hovering just above structure. Once you mark fish, present your bait just over their heads. Keep your movements slow



and steady. A gentle lift and pause often outperforms constant motion. If you are vertical jigging, hold your bait still for several seconds between twitches.

This is the time of year to check the 154, 515 east and west bridges - they will hold tight to concrete. When the water dips below 60 degrees, check the deeper brush around the Little Caney area off secondary points or creek bends. Just remember when a cold front hits. fish deeper and slower. Windy or overcast days can push crappie tighter into cover.

November is a great month to rely on both jigs and minnows. I use 1/16 and 1/8 oz. jigs depending on wind and the depth I'm fishing. The bait colors that produce in November has

been Money Milk, Blue Ice, or any shad color in soft baits, and black/chartreuse, pink/white tail, and electric chicken in hand tied baits.

So, don't miss out on one of Lake Forks most productive months of the year. Bundle up, keep your coffee hot, and take a camera and experience November excitement on Lake Fork!

"Taking just a few minutes for these simple steps can help prevent impacts on ecosystems, infrastructure and recreation, and make a huge difference in our efforts to protect and preserve Texas lakes for current and future generations."

Zebra mussels are now found in 39 Texas lakes across seven river basins, as well as in reaches downnumerous at-risk lakes around the state for early detection of zebra and closely related quagga mussels. Once they've been introduced and established in a lake, nothing can be done to control or eradicate them. On top of the harm invasive species cause aquatic ecosystems, water infrastructure and the recreational experience at lakes, the transport of these organ-

> isms can result in legal trouble for boaters. Transporting prohibited aquatic invasive species in Texas is illegal and punishable with a fine of up to \$500 per violation. It's also the law that boaters must drain all water from their boat

and onboard receptacles, including bait buckets, before leaving or approaching a body of fresh water. They must also remove all invasive plants from the boat, trailer and tow vehicle before leaving a lake.

TPWD and partners monitor for invasive species in Texas lakes, but need your help. Anyone who finds them in lakes where they haven't been reported before — or who spots them on boats, trailers or equipment being moved— can help identify and prevent new introductions by reporting the sighting of invasive species being moved to TPWD immediately at (512) 389-4848 or by emailing photos and location information for new invasions to aquaticinvasives@tpwd.texas.gov.

Quail hunting season kicks off on Nov. 1 in Texas, and the annual Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) roadside survey revealed some encouraging population numbers heading into opening day. Good habitat conditions along with timely rainfall helped bobwhite and scaled quail production this last spring and summer.

"Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists covered over 3,300 road miles in early August during our annual roadside quail surveys," said Patrick Schutz, TPWD Upland Game Bird Program Leader. "Overall, we are encouraged by the numbers in this year's surveys and anticipate a good season for hunters especially in the Rolling Plains, South Texas and Trans Pecos regions where populations have traditionally been the strongest."


Bobwhite quail benefited from improved habitat for chicks thanks to above average rainfall throughout most of their range. Bobwhite populations in the Rolling Plains appear to be similar to last year but reports in many areas in this ecoregion show above average bobwhite numbers.

Teacup Mountain Wildlife Management Area (WMA) in north Texas will provide a new public hunting opportunity for this upcoming season. Along with the Matador WMA, TPWD expects average to above average hunting opportunities at these WMAs.

South Texas should provide good opportunities for hunters looking to harvest birds this fall. The typical number of bobwhites seen per route by biologists was 12.70 compared to 9.13 last year, above the 15-year mean of 9.78.

"South Texas remains a stronghold and bobwhite populations appeared to increase the further south you go within the region," said Schutz. "This region accounted for over 50 percent of the estimated total bobwhite harvest last season and biologists are encouraged by the bobwhite numbers they've observed recently. Public hunting opportunities in this ecoregion can be found at the Chaparral and James E. Daughtrey Wildlife Management Areas and we expect these WMAs to provide fair hunting conditions." The 2025 scaled quail population survey revealed that population numbers increased across their range. The average number of scaled quail seen by biologists was above the 15-year mean in all ecoregions and reported good carryover

from the previous year. Birds were observed on more than 70 percent of the surveys in the Trans Pecos ecoregion and on more than 50 percent of the routes in the Edwards Plateau ecoregion.

"The Trans-Pecos and Edwards Plateau were in drought conditions early on, but rainfall and habitat conditions improved through mid to later summer," said Schutz. "Early spring rains and good habitat conditions in the High Plains provided for some early nesting, increased calling activity and mul-

tiple broods observed throughout the region."

The Edwards Plateau and High Plains ecoregions made the biggest leaps in scaled quail sightings during August surveys. The average number of scaled quail seen in the Edwards Plateau was 14 per route compared to 6.38 last year, which was significantly above the 15-year mean of 6.47. Out in the High Plains, the number of scaled quail seen per route by biologists was 7.75 compared to 3.83 last year, above the 15-year mean of 3.42.

TPWD biologists expect Black Gap and Elephant Mountain WMAs to provide average to above average opportunities for scaled quail despite limited early season production due to continuing drought in the region.

TPWD provides a full regional breakdown of this year's TPWD quail index survey for northern bobwhite and scaled quail, including highlights and prospects. For county specific outlooks, contact a local TPWD wildlife biologist. Statewide surveys were initiated in 1978 to monitor quail populations — historical survey data, 1978 to 2025 — and are available on the TPWD website. TPWD surveys are only designed to provide a representation of bobwhite and scaled quail populations at the regional level and local conditions may vary considerably.

Hunting Lands must have the Annual Public Hunting Permit. Public land hunters must check the Public Hunting Lands Map Booklet to review regulations that may apply to specific areas. The Texas Hunt & Fish app can be used to complete on-site registration electronically at a public hunting area.

Biologists Predict Favorable Season for Waterfowl Hunters

erage rainfall during the summer months is a confidence booster for hunters preparing for the start of the new waterfowl hunting season.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department

(TPWD) biologists indicated that teal, gadwall, wigeon, pintails, shovelers and redheads, key duck species for Texas hunters, are collectively plentiful and showed population increases this past summer. "Texas hunters can anticipate another strong waterfowl season, though overall success will depend on local water availability and the timing of cold fronts," said Kevin Kraai, TPWD Waterfowl Program Leader. "Hunters who scout actively and find fresh shallow water will have the best opportunities this season."

Hunters will also benefit from the new three-bird daily bag limit for pintails. A recent analysis confirmed that pintails are more numerous than the U.S. Fish and

Abundant population numbers and above av- Wildlife Service (USFWS) May Waterfowl long-term averages. The upshot are habitats Breeding Population and Habitat Survey detected. The new fall flight models also indicate the potential for a greater sustainable harvest compared to previous models.

> On the weather front, the above average summer rainfall resulted in numerous reservoirs and stock ponds holding more water than last year. The increased water levels have expanded habit for migrating ducks, but hot and dry conditions during the month of September have begun to reduce shallow wetlands, playa lakes and other surface water. Hunters can expect birds to concentrate in areas where rainfall or active management has maintained fresh habitat.

> On the coast, irrigation restrictions tied to low Highland Lake levels last year have resulted in fewer flooded rice fields this fall. Rice acreage across the state is slightly lower than last year and continues to trail the

in coastal marshes and large reservoirs are in good condition. Most High Plains playas are also still holding water, but new rainfall is needed to prevent them from drying out.

The National Weather Service outlook calls for a developing La Niña this winter which usually means warmer and drier conditions are more likely. However, individual cold fronts will continue to drive waterfowl migrations into Texas and hunters should be prepared to take advantage of these weather events as they occur. In addition to ducks, TPWD biologists denote that goose hunting prospects are strong due to a second year of improved productivity that could send more juvenile birds south. Those factors typically lead to better decoy response and higher harvest success for Texas hunters.

Kraai reminds migratory bird hunters that they need to make sure they are Harvest Information Program (HIP) certified and confirm the questions are answered correctly. HIP surveys allow biologists to get an accurate sample of hunters so the US-FWS can deliver harvest surveys to a subsample of hunters during the hunting season. Hunters should purchase their new 2025-26 Texas hunting license prior to hitting the field. In addition, waterfowl hunters will also need a migratory game bird endorsement, federal duck stamp and HIP certification. It's also required by law that hunters have proof of their completion of a hunter education course. The Duck Stamp Modernization Act of 2023 modified provisions of the Migratory Bird

tion regarding goose seasons and daily bag Hunting and Conservation Stamp, commonly an individual to carry an electronic stamp (Estamp) for the entire waterfowl hunting season. A physical Federal Duck Stamp will be mailed to each E-stamp purchaser after the hunting season between March 10 - June 30, 2026.



Game Warden Field Notes

The following items are compiled from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement reports.

-Bee Careful! A swarm of bees attacked a rancher utilizing an open top bulldozer to clear brush from his property when he inadvertently ran over their hive. Unable to be removed from his vehicle, a ranch hand covered him in blankets and called emergency services for assistance. Supported by local EMS, Sheriff's Department, and Eldorado Volunteer Fire Department, Schleicher and Sutton County Game Wardens responded to the incident.

The volunteer fire department sprayed down the area to remove some of the bees. One of the responding wardens, an avid beekeeper in his spare time, applied his knowledge to reach the rancher. Wearing his personal beekeeping suits, the wardens and sheriff were able to remove the man from the bulldozer. Since the area was inaccessible to EMS vehicles, the wardens cleared their truck and transported the severely stung operator to EMS vehicles who were waiting to take him to the hospital. He recovered from his injuries.

-Tubin' to the Oldies-Real and Uvalde County

Game Wardens received a call about a 67-year-old man who had been separated from his family while tubing down the river. After interviewing the family and the outfitter, wardens determined that the tuber failed to exit at the designated area and continued downstream. One of the wardens drove to a nearby ranch where he launched a drone in an attempt to locate the tuber. At the same time the other warden spoke to the foreman of the ranch and requested assistance in locating the tuber. The foreman spoke to a group of tubers who said they saw the individual.

Give Tom Turkey the Night Off This Year

People look forward to the Thanksgiving holiday for a number of reasons: there's the opportunity to see family and friends, children relish a couple of days off from school, and most everyone table of holiday treats.

Traditionally, Thanksgiving and turkey go hand-in-hand, however that doesn't mean that the holiday would flop should you choose to serve another main course in the turkey's place. (The turkey

enjoys the over-flowing probably wouldn't mind either!)

> **Bubbette's Autumn Chicken With Dijon** Cider Sauce

Sauce:

2 cups apple cider

1-1/2 cups 1% milk

2 tablespoons corn-starch

2 tablespoons Dijon mustard

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon ground red pepper

Apples:

2 tablespoons butter

2 large apples, with peel, cored and cut into 1/4-inch rings

Chicken:

1/3 cup all-purpose flour 3/4 teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon ground black pepper

6 boneless, skinless chicken breast halves

1 tablespoon dry sherry or apple juice

To make the sauce: In a medium sauce-pan, bring the cider to a boil over medium-high heat and cook 1/4 teaspoon ground black for 15 minutes, or until reduced to ½ cup. Transfer to a cup and let cool. In the same saucepan, add all but 2 tablespoons of the milk. In a cup, dissolve the comstarch in the remaining 2 tablespoons milk and add to the pan. Stir in the mustard, salt, black pepper and red pepper. Cook and stir over medium heat for 3 to 5 minutes. or until the mixture begins to thicken. Stir in the cooled reduced cider. Cook and stir until bubbly. Remove from the heat and set aside.

To make the apples: Preheat the oven to 200F. Melt the butter in a large skillet. Add the apples and cook over medium heat for 3 minutes per side, or just until tender. Transfer to an ovensafe platter and place in the oven to keep warm. Leave the butter in the skillet for cooking the chicken.

To make the chicken: In a shallow dish combine the flour, salt and pepper. Place the chicken breasts between two pieces of plastic wrap and, using a mallet, pound

each to 1/2-inch thickness. Dredge the chicken in the flour mixture and shake off any excess. Place the chicken in the skillet that contains the butter. Cook over medium-high heat for 5 minutes per side, or until a thermometer inserted in the thickest portion registers 160 F and the juices run clear. Transfer to the apple platter and keep warm in the oven. Add the sherry or apple juice to the skillet. Cook and stir over medium heat for one minute, scraping up the browned bits from the bottom of the pan. Add the cider sauce and cook for 4 minutes, or until heated through.

Arrange the chicken and apple slices on 6 dinner plates. Top with sauce.

The information was relayed to both wardens and based off their tips, the wardens located the individual and returned him to his family.


-Shell Shocked- A warden was contacted by a state biologist about an inquiry made by a local elementary school regarding rehabilitating Texas tortoises. After learning more about the situation, the warden determined that the school was keeping approximately 24 tortoises inside a small atrium on school property. Unfortunately, the tortoises were a threatened species and unable to be possessed by any individual or entity. School staff stated that several years ago they acquired two tortoises and over the years, students brought more tortoises into the facility. The warden arrived at the school to collect the tortoises for TPWD assisted relocation. In doing so, the curious students and staff gathered around the atrium to watch and the warden made use of the attention by turning the removal into an impromptu educational program on the tortoises and their natural habitat. The tortoises were later released at a nearby ranch in prime Texas tortoise habitat.

-Mother Knows Best- Over the Memorial Day weekend, game wardens conducting water safety patrols were sent videos of a male jumping off a red and white boat, harassing and capturing a Canada Goose. Despite efforts to locate the boat and the individuals involved, wardens were unable to track them down. Two months later while conducting a water safety check on a different boat, the same wardens who initially received the videos noticed several of the occupants on the vessel wearing identical hats to those in the video. One of the Wardens humorously asked about the hats and if they knew the individual who had caught the goose in the video. The occupants confirmed they knew him and affirmed their knowledge of the "goose video". They pointed to a male in the back of the boat and identified him as the "goose capturer". The Wardens asked the identified male to join them on their boat for further questioning. The male admitted he was the one in the video and said his mom had warned him that he was going to get into trouble. He added, "I should've listened to my mom!" Wardens explained to the individual the definition of "Hunt," according to Texas law is "To capture, trap, take or kill, or any attempts thereof." Accordingly, the individual was issued a citation for "Hunting Canada Geese in a Closed Season." He was also issued a written warning for "Hunting Canada Geese by Illegal Means and Methods." The goose survived.

—Old Fishing Buddy— Texas Game Wardens were patrolling for water safety and recreational fishing activity when they received information regarding a boat that potentially possessed over the daily bag limit of red snapper. The Wardens located the unoccupied boat moored at a dock. Upon performing an inspection, twenty-one red snapper were found on board, exceeding the individual fishing limit. Wardens attempted to contact the occupants of the house where the boat was docked. After approximately thirty minutes of knocking, announcing, speaking with neighbors and attempting to call the suspect and his family members, an individual exited the residence. The

suspect was immediately evasive when questioned about the red snapper in the boat. He stated that he had caught them with five other people but only provided one name. The Wardens contacted the individual who stated he had not talked to the suspect in fifteen years. The suspect admitted to going over his daily bag limit to the wardens. Seventeen red snappers were seized, and citations issued, along with civil restitution.

-Sting Operation— In August, a concerned citizen contacted Montgomery County game wardens regarding a neighbor keeping an alligator in his back yard. The wardens responded to the home where the alligator was reportedly kept. The homeowner admitted to capturing an alligator 4 or 5 feet in length from Lake Conroe, transporting it home to show his kids and then releasing it the next day. The wardens inspected the property and noticed a room full of aquariums. Knowledgeable in aquatic species, one of the wardens identified the animals as freshwater stingrays, which are an invasive species and illegal to possess. Through further conversation, the homeowner also admitted to removing a small alligator snapping

turtle from Lake Livingston and keeping it in a tank. As the largest freshwater turtle in North America and a threatened species, it is illegal to capture or possess one without a permit. After discussing the matter with the homeowner, he agreed to assist game wardens in relocating the animals to better suited facilities. The turtle was donated to the Spring Creek Nature Center, which is permitted to possess native species and display them for educational purposes. The stingrays were transported to Moody Gardens to educate the public about different ecosystems and the harm that invasive species can cause to local wildlife. -Perception Pays Off- The El Paso County Sheriff's Office Major Crimes Unit released a "Be on the Lookout" bulletin to assist in the identification of an individual and vehicle last seen leaving a crime scene in the San Elizario area. An El Paso/Hudspeth County game warden remembered the vehicle from a recent encounter with fishermen which resulted in the arrest of the individual. The warden contacted the lead investigator and passed

without firm leads in the case, the information he shared with their office was vital in locating the subject and the vehicle. Due to his inter-agency collaboration, an arrest was carried out.

-Hold the Pepper- In September, a Bexar County game warden received a call from Austin communica-tions about dove hunters peppering lo-cal residences with shotgun pellets. Upon arrival to the field, the warden observed two gentlemen hunting. As he drove up to the individuals, one of the gentlemen stood up and shot a bird that fell a few yards from him. The warden pro-ceeded to complete a hunting check. He spoke with the indi-vidual and asked if he was aware of the type of bird he had just shot. The hunter did not know. The warden informed him that the bird was an American kestrel, a protected bird of prey, and is not allowed to be hunted or harvested. The warden checked the other hunters in the group and discussed the issues around peppering, ensuring their shotgun pellets did not cross property lines. A citation was issued for harvesting a protected species. The case and civil restitution are pending.


